## REVIEW OF CATCHMENT AREAS: DALIBURGH & IOCHDAR SCHOOLS

Report by Chief Officer for Education and Children's Services

### PURPOSE

- 1.1 The purpose of the report is to inform the Comhairle of a request received to review and rezone the catchment boundary for two schools in South Uist and to seek approval to commence the first informal stage of statutory consultation in relation to the request.

### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- 2.1 Following the closure of Stoneybridge School in 2011, the full catchment of that school, namely the townships of Stoneybridge, North Stoneybridge and Ormiclete, were subsumed in the catchment for lochdar School.
- 2.2 A number of parents resident within the current lochdar School catchment, predominantly resident within the old Stoneybridge catchment, have chosen to make placing requests to Daliburgh School. Stated reasons have included proximity to Daliburgh School compared to lochdar and links to childcare and after-school provision at Cothrom.
- 2.3 As per Comhairle policy, children resident out-with the school catchment that are subject to a placing request for another school are not entitled to school transport and parents are responsible for making their own alternative transport provision.
- 2.4 Following a meeting of Daliburgh Parent Council, the Education & Children's Services Department was in receipt of a formal letter from that body requesting a review be undertaken to rezone the catchment of Daliburgh School to include Snishival and all townships south of that point.
- 2.5 School catchment boundary rezoning is subject to the requirements of the Schools (Consultation) (Scotland) Act 2010, as defined in schedule 1 para. 4 (a) of the Act. If approved, the consultation on this matter must be conducted in accordance with the stipulations of the Act; the first stage of which is to seek committee approval to commence consultation at the informal stage.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 3.1 **It is recommended that the Comhairle consider the request from Daliburgh Parent Council regarding a rezoning of the catchment of the school and agree to the commencement of the informal stage of the statutory consultation process.**

## **BACKGROUND**

- 5.1 During the consultation on the closure of Stoneybridge School, conducted in 2010, it was identified that the catchment of the school, comprising of the three middle district townships of Stoneybridge, North Stoneybridge and Ormiclete, be merged into the catchment of lochdar School in full, with effect from August 2011.
- 5.2 Following the Comhairle vote to proceed with the closure of Stoneybridge School in 2010, the school closed in June 2011 and the catchment area for lochdar School was subsequently extended to incorporate the three townships, moving the catchment boundary effectively to the junction of the Ormiclete road and the A865 where the Cothrom premises is situated.
- 5.3 In recent years, several parents resident in the middle district part of the catchment for lochdar School have made placing requests for their children to attend Daliburgh School. As such, they do not have entitlement to access home-to-school transport.

## **DETAIL**

- 6.1 Daliburgh Parent Council has written to the Education and Children's Services Department formally requesting the initiation of a consultation on a rezoning of catchments for Daliburgh and lochdar schools. Their request references incorporation of an area of the middle district of South Uist into the Daliburgh catchment, thus removing it from lochdar School catchment. Their request follows meetings held by the Parent Council to consider representations from parents living in the in the southern part of the lochdar catchment that have chosen to make a placing request for their children to attend Daliburgh School.
- 6.2 Daliburgh Parent Council is seeking to extend their current catchment to include the township of Snishival, incorporating all other areas south of this point. This proposal encompasses the whole of the original Stoneybridge School catchment and extends beyond that to include Peninerine and Snishival that were historically always in lochdar School catchment. The primary reason for their request is to allow out-of-catchment children in this area to be recognised as being in catchment and, therefore, eligible for school transport to and from Daliburgh.
- 6.3 There are currently six children enrolled in Daliburgh School that reside within the catchment of lochdar school. They are from Stoneybridge, Ormiclete and Snishival. There are also children resident within this area that attend lochdar School and the proposed consultation will need to consider impact on them in terms of their continuing eligibility to attend that school. Should the process conclude in favour of the rezoning of the two schools, this will represent a permanent change that will affect all future enrolments.
- 6.4 The current catchment areas of the two schools are provided below with affected communities highlighted.

### **lochdar School:**

Ardchuig, Ardivachair, Ardmhor, Ardnamonie, Balgarva, Bualadubh, Carnan, Graigstrome, Creagorry, Drimsdale, East & West Gernish, Griminish, Grimsay Island, Grogarry, Hacklete, Holmar, Howbeg, Howmore, lochdar, Kilaulay, Kilerivagh, Lincilate, Linique, Lochcarnan, Lochskipport, Noss, **Peninerine**, Petersport, Rhughashinish, Sandwick, **Snishival**, Stillgarry, Torlum, Uskevagh, **Ormiclete**, **Stoneybridge**, **North Stoneybridge**.

- 6.5 Representation have been made through the lochdar School Parent Council expressing concern at the proposal in terms of reducing the area of their catchment, with a potential consequence that removing five townships could further threaten a school with a roll that has been declining over recent years.
- 6.6 If the recommendation of the report is approved, the Comhairle must conduct the consultation in accordance with the requirements of the School (Consultation) (Scotland) Act 2010 as the action of rezoning school catchments is a recognised activity within the act. This will require compliance with a set of processes and timelines that include informal and formal consultation stages, future reports to committee, public meetings and referral to Education Scotland.
- 6.7 A broad outline of the statutory consultation process is set out below.

- 6.8 Based on the statutory requirements of the consultation, should the proposals be agreed, it is likely that it would take until the committee series in either November 2024 or February 2025 for the process to be finalised for subsequent implementation in August 2025.

## **CONCLUSION**

- 7.1 The initial rezoning proposal made by Daliburgh School Parent Council represents a significant change in the catchment for the South Uist schools and would currently affect a small number of children. It is recommended that consideration is given to approving commencement of the informal stage of the consultation process to permit the gathering of views across the stakeholders of both schools to allow for the Comhairle to make an informed future decision about the statutory formal consultation stage.
