FOREWARD

I am pleased to present the 2024-25 Annual Report for Comhairle nan Eilean Siar Community Learning & Development (CLD), which outlines just some of the achievements and work that CLD has been involved in from 1st April 2024 and 31st March 2025.

Community Learning and Development (CLD) support people to make positive changes in their own lives or in their community, by using a range of different approaches, including youth work and community development.

The current iteration of the CLD Partnership Plan 2024-2027 was published in September 2024 (it requires to be refreshed every 3 years). The plan created in conjunction with key partners sets out the priorities for CLD and its Partners across five key areas – Promoting Lifelong Learning; Strengthening Community Engagement; Enhancing Social Inclusion; Empowering Youth and Evaluating and Improving. Progress against the plan is recorded by an annual self evaluation with partners and externally by colleagues in HMIE who do regular inspections on the CLD Plan Progress.

The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) and youth work are intrinsically linked, with youth work playing a crucial role in upholding and advancing children's rights. Within this Annual Report CLD are highlighting the range of UNCRC Articles that are being met through each project.

Pointers Youth Cafe

Friday afternoon drop in has continued throughout the year. We have seen some new faces from S1 & S2 coming along now. A Saturday evening drop in started after the young people requested it. This continued for about 5 months until we put it on hold over the summer to use the staff hours to offer more activities throughout the summer period. Saturday evening drop in then ceased due to staffing issues. Regular drop ins were held over the summer break with different activity days as requested such as a water fight and getting festival ready with hair and face painting for the Heb Celt Festival.

There were requests for something for the older age group. A Thursday evening drop in for 18-25 year olds was set up. This unfortunately also had to stop due to staffing issues.

We had over 300 people on the evening and donations raised for Alzheimer

The Community Pay Back team took the Youth Committees vision and painted the grotto, built a fireplace and put up all the high up decorations. We are very grateful to team for their assistance.

A fundraising music night was held in partnership with local musicians where we had 5 musicians performing aged 16 – 30. Pointers hope to get back to holding music nights on a more regular basis. These are open to all in the community, not just young people.

Young Carers Group

This year Pointers Young Carers Western Isles has been launched offering support to all young carers from Primary 4 – Secondary 6 Western Isles wide.

Young Carers Group in Lewis continue to meet weekly for a social time, giving them a break from their caring roles. Regular weekly activities include cooking, sports, chilling out & game days.







Young Mums Group.

Pointers are working in partnership Family Support Team.
There are now 2 weekly groups running with 17 mums being supported over the last year. Groups meet weekly, with termly plans development with mums, to offer both mums and children, a fun, safe space to learn and play.

Opportunities provided allow mums to find out more about different services available to them such as apprenticeships, mental health support and more in-depth support that the family team can offer such as one to one support, Anti-natal and post-natal Peep – Learning Together Programme, Positive Parenting Programme, baby massage and much more.



Nurture Groups

Nurture groups are safe places for pupils in schools to come together to take part in activities that build resilience and promote positive relationships between peers. In Harris, CLD visits Leverhulme Memorial School and Sir E Scott School to work with pupils on a weekly basis.

Enhanced P7 transitions have been delivered to some pupils needing extra support in addition to the CLD Transitions programme and other activities include enterprise projects, arts and crafts and games.

Mentors in Violence Prevention

The Mentors in Violence Prevention programme was delivered to nearly 60 S6 pupils in the Nicolson Institute at the beginning of the term. There are plans to run the programme again, with the aim of including S2 pupils in the next phase.

P7 Transitions

Community Learning & Development in partnership with local schools deliver a programme for pupils on P7 who will be moving onto Secondary School.

 - To introduce them to their peers from other communities
- To answer any questions and dispel myths and fears

In Lewis, CLD hosted a free youth event in the Stornoway Town Hall bringing together youth work partners - offering fun activities, games and lots of freebies.

In Uist, youth work partners shared youth information with young people in Sgoil Lionacleit and at the Youth Cafe.

In Barra, CLD worked with other local partners and had a stall in the school where pupils took part in MSYP survey and also gave input into the Local Place Plan with Area Forum Development Officer.

This Year the Angus Clinton Memorial Award was presented to Donald Macsween who supports the Nicolson Institute Group, this award was presented by Alasdair Allan, MSP.

Barra Group DofE Awards

17 young people took part in the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award and 8 Barra participants took part in their Silver award. This award is popular in Barra with over 80% of S3-6's signing up to take part each year. All the young people who sign up help to volunteer in local clubs and organisations and in 2024, over 210 volunteering hours were amassed between them all and this is a tremendous amount of volunteering hours given back to the community by young people.

<u>Lewis Annual Award Presentation - December 2024</u>

The Western Isles Duke of Edinburgh's Award Ceremony for Lewis participants took place on Friday 29th November in the Assembly Hall, Nicolson Institute, Stornoway. This year's Ceremony was opened by Cllr Paul Finnegan, Chair of Education Sports & Children's Services Committee, Comhairle nan Eilean Siar.Over 100 young people were presented with Duke of Edinburgh's Award Certificates which is a significant achievement. 44 Bronze Sections certificates; 19 Full Bronze Awards; 30 Silver Section Certificates; 5 Full Silver Awards; 15 Gold Section Certificates & 1 Gold Award completed. 40 Certificates of Achievement were also presented. The Awards were presented by Alasdair Allan, MSP.

Young Scot

Young Scot is delivered through Community Learning and Development (CLD). CLD promote the Young Scot opportunities through school inputs, youth work activities and their social media. CLD manage the applications and processing of all Young Scot applications for the Western Isles.

- 3,651 young people have a valid Young Scot NEC in the Western Isles. This represents 88% of the estimated population of 11 to 25 year olds in the area
- 606 young people are signed up to Young Scot Membership giving access to a range of entitlements such as rewards and online discounts.
- 40 young people in the Western Isles received Young Scot Reward vouchers in April (Coop, ASOS & Amazon) total value of £600.
- Young people with cards issued in the Western Isles have made 2686 bus journeys from April 2024 - March 2025.
- CLD ran fortnightly 'Drop-in & Chat' events in Pointers Youth Cafe.

Youth Awards

30 Hi5 Awards and 116 Dynamic Youth Awards were achieved through CLDs work in local schools and in youth groups. They are credit-rated awards that can act as a framework to record and recognise young people's achievements.







Resilient Kids

The Resilient Kids Together program was created by Highland council with the design to foster a person's emotional literacy. This program widely recognizes that when emotional intelligence is targeted within a school curriculum, academic achievement is raised, nurturing builds resilience and being included has a positive effect on emotional wellbeing and behavior.

16 sessions were delivered in total to P1-4 and P5-7 Nurture groups in Castlebay Primary School with the aim of the program to help pupils to develop skills, build confidence and become more resilient. 8 sessions were delivered to S3 year group and the program explored various issues which helps pupils to develop skills, build confidence and become more resilient.

Hot Spot Intervention Team

The Hotspot Intervention team project is aimed at responding to the wants and needs of young people through a need-led programme. The H.I.T (Hotspot Intervention Team) work primarily in Stornoway North and South and in pockets where there is little to no youth work provision, and in areas where anti-social behaviour and the associated risks have been highlighted as an issue. The main aim of all activities offered is that young people are engaged in positive youth work activities within their area to deflect from risk taking behaviour.

Since April 2024 158 young people have registered and taken part in activities organised by CLD and H.I.T

Hot Spot Intervention Team

Christmas Event

SSEN Transmission's Lewis Hub project donated £2,000 to the HIT Christmas Events. Among the activities were parties for under-5s and Primary 1-7s that featured a Santa's grotto and cupcake decorating, among many other activities. Meanwhile, a Christmas rave for S1-4 pupils featuring local DJ Gordie Campbell included gaming stations and a disco dome. These activities provided support, snacks, entertainment and gifts to over 300 young people, and engaged with over 150 parents and guardians over two days of events.



Sea Angling Junior Group running every Monday in the Sea angling in partnership with H.I.T and the SYSAC targeting 1st to 4th years. 47 young people are registered for this group with 26-30 attending each week on average

April to October The Sea Angling Juniors participate in monthly Sea Angling competitions on the SYSAC2. A Juniors presentation ceremony was held in December 2024. This is the 2nd of its kind to take place in over a decade. With the first one taking place in December 2023.









Members of Scottish Youth Parliament (MSYPs)
Ellie Denehy MSYP and Alannah Logue MSYP both
attended the 81st Sitting of the Scottish Youth
Parliament (SYP) in Stirling.

This was Ellie Denehy's first Sitting as an MSYP and the Sitting proved to be a great start to the 2023-2025 Membership. Members of Scottish Youth Parliaments (MSYPs) debated motions from free access to outdoor sporting facilities to calling for improved public transport.

The Western Isles for the first time has an MSYP as a trustee on the SYP Board - Alannah. In this important role, Alannah will be involved in key decision making within SYP. This is a huge achievement.

The 82nd Sitting of the Scottish Youth Parliament took place in November at the Scottish Parliament. MSYPs debated many topics including Gaelic education and vaping. Unfortunately due to fog Ellie was unable to attend.

Ellie Denehy and Alannah Logue (Members of the Scottish Youth Parliament for the Western Isles) conducted a youth survey during Youth Work Week 2024.

219 young people completed the survey, 96% were aged between 12-16 years old.

Through the initiative, Alannah and Ellie, sought to give young people the chance to share their perspectives on life in their island communities and what could be improved. They have compiled a report which has been sent to Councillors and decision makers for consideration and action.

Barra & Vatersay Young Islanders Youth Voice

The Young Islanders of Barra & Vatersay have been working hard in highlighting local concerns they have about the flooding of their local grass pitch and also have highlighted the poor state of the playpark in Castlebay. They did a walkabout and highlighted all the blocked culverts and areas that need improved in Castlebay and written to their local Councillors to highlight these issues as well as met with their local MSYP.

The young islanders also took part in a conservation project which involved taking a boat trip to Mingulay and working with National Trust ranger and bird volunteers. They learnt a lot about the seals and the bird colony and the importance of biodiversity and also enjoyed "beating back the bracken" at the old village to help reduce the weeds taking over the ruins of the village

The Lewis Youth Council

The Young Islanders in Barra took part in a Young Islanders Network Skye Residential, meeting with 30 other young islanders from Lewis, Coll, Tiree, Skye, Raasay and Orkney. As well as going to Raasay to take part in a conservation project, they actively engaged with representatives from the Scottish Government's Islands team to discuss the National Islands Plan. This involved making contributions to 7 themes linked to the National Plan as well as engaging in the Housing challenge report which highlighted the lack of affordable housing for young people throughout the islands.

Learning for Sustainability

The Scottish Youth Parliament consulted the Lewis Youth Council and pupils at the Nicolson Institute on behalf of the Scottish Government and Learning For Sustainability Youth Leadership Team, on their understanding and experiences of Learning for Sustainability. Topics discussed included outdoor learning, fast fashion, and school and youth residential opportunities.

Area Forum

CLD support the various Area Fora throughout the Western Isles. Barra & Vatersay Area Forum; Harris Forum; Pairc Area Forum; Uig Forum; Dalmore to Lochganvich Forum, Ness & Westside Forum, Point Forum.

Who is on the Area Forum?

The Area Forum group is made up of representatives from all community groups in the area.

The Role of the local Area Forum is:

- to promote and grow the area's economy and maximise the full potential of community and place
- to be a focal point for community driven ideas and solutions that will support reinvigorating the local economy
- to identify, take ownership of, prioritise and drive the delivery of new opportunities
- to make recommendations to the Comhairle, HIE and other agencies on how diminishing resources can best be utilized in support of reinvigorating the local economy
 - to engage directly with key sectors to support the delivery of sectoral plans and priorities
 - to assess all Crown Estate applications for their Ward area
 - to develop local plans for their area.





Locality Group

The Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act 2015 places a responsibility on CPPs to produce two types of plans, outlining local priorities, required actions and timescales. The first is the Local Outcomes Improvement Plan (LOIP), which encompasses the entire local authority area. The second type is a Locality Plan and covers smaller areas, usually focusing on the areas requiring most improvement. Each CPP will produce at least one Locality Plan. As the main aim is to address local needs and ambitions, it is important the views of the community are heard and incorporated into any plans.

The Outer Hebrides Community Planning Partnership (OHCPP) have agreed two priority areas, one of which is Stornoway West (Stornoway North) – with a particular focus on the Cearns within the Stornoway West area. As a result, a locality group was formed in the Stornoway West area (NHS) Stornoway North (LA). There are several groups from Stornoway North represented within the group, as well as Police Scotland, NHS, CNES, HHP (Hebridean Housing Partnership) and the Stornoway North Development Worker. As a group an area plan was developed focusing on the wants and needs of the area and working towards improving life chances across the area. In 2019 the first area plan was developed with a 2nd plan published in 2023. Each representative reports to the locality and in turn the locality group report to the CPP.

Learning for Fun

Learning for Fun group is a partnership between CLD, Beairteas Bharraigh & Barra Learning Centre and brings together local tutors on the island who run different adult creative classes. These classes help bring people together in particular during the winter months and have enabled new skills and new friendships to be formed.

- 24 weeks of classes were run from Oct 2024-March 2025
 70 classes took place between Art, Pottery, Sewing, Cookery & Garland
 - 60 individual adults took part in classes
 - Age of participants 16-80 years old
 - Average age over 45 years











International Women's Day





Crown Estate

The Crown Estate Revenue Fund was introduced as a UK-wide programme created and funded by the UK Government with the aim of encouraging the economic development of UK coastal communities by awarding funding to create sustainable economic growth and jobs. New Scottish arrangements were announced by Scottish Ministers in 2019, replacing the CCF and allocating funding to coastal Local Authorities to deliver coastal community benefit. The funding allocations come from revenue generated from Scottish Crown Estate marine assets out to 12 nautical miles.

Comhairle nan Eilean Siar has utilised the Fund for a mix of strategic investments and to create a local Coastal Fund to support local projects and initiatives. Initially, the Comhairle sought to stimulate community wealth building and community empowerment by devolving project consideration and decision-making down to each council Ward area and It is proposed to maintain that broad approach going forward.

The CLD Team has been involved in the dissemination of Crown Estate (renamed Coastal Communities Fund) for the last four years and assists community groups to create change in their communities via locally supported funding applications. Confidence has grown amongst community groups as they have successfully navigated this funding landscape, using the benefits of decentralised decision making to create positive change throughout the Western Isles.

Crown Estate examples of funded projects

Coastal Erosion at Bragar Cemetery

The Cemetery Committee approached Urras Sgire
Oighreachd Bharabhais for help. The Urras was able to offer
them administration help and so was able to help apply for
funding as well as give advice on setting up the Just Giving
page The funding for the area of most coastal erosion was
raised through Crown Estate Fund, Horshader Community
Development Trust and the Just Giving page. The work was
project managed by Donald Armstrong of Wallace Stone
Consulting Civil Engineers. The tender was awarded to
AMK with the stone coming from the North West Aggregates
quarry in South Shawbost.





Meavaig North Seasonal Toilet

The CERF5 award was made at the end of June 2024. Time was then spent searching for match funding. Suitable funds were secured at the end of October. Planning Approval was secured at the end of January 2025.

It is hoped that this new infrastructure will help protect the local environment from wild-toileting. It will improve the quality of life of residents who share this space with the visitors. It will make the Eagle Observatory a more attractive visitor destination, indirectly increasing visitor spend in Harris. The Crown Estate Revenue Fund award allowed The North Harris Trust to attract match funding for this community-driven project. Its success will only become apparent when the summer visitor season gets underway.

Sandwickhill Development Trust (SDT)

Sandwickhill Development Trust (SDT) has been working on a project to provide a multi-function Community Building to serve the Sandwickhill Community. Three initial options were proposed:

- A new build on the old school building site meaning the demolition of the old school building
 - A new build on the current football pitch
- Repurpose the old Sandwickhill school building to bring it back into use within the community.

After initial conversations with SDT, it was clear that the new build option on the football pitch was not an option that they wanted to progress, and there was a reluctance to demolish the old school building completely, although some demolition of the most derelict sections would be welcomed. It was concluded that the preferred option was to renovate, repurpose and retain the historic school building.

The project is progressing to the next stage of development, and a business plan is in place with a view to purchasing the old school immediately.

CLD will continue to support this project to its fruition.

Community Fridge

The main aim of the Community Fridge is to stop good food from going to waste and helping to alleviate food insecurities. The Community Fridge helps support families by providing a warm safe space, hot meal, and fresh foods supplies.



- Ongoing support from Co-op Stornoway who keep the fridge topped up on a weekly basis with fresh food supplies.
- Built up a strong rapport with Williamsons who are a fruit and veg wholesaler, who deliver fresh produce to the community fridge bi-weekly.
- All meals are prepared with produce we get from our generous suppliers.
- A total of 605.084 KG of foods has been saved from landfill from 2nd February to 6th December 2024. These weights are the equivalent of a chunky Polar Bear or a skinny wilderbeast.

•633 people made use of the Community Fridge in 2024
•136 hot meals were delivered to senior citizens in July and August
•Volunteer run







Newmarket Gateway

- •Funding secured through Crown Estates and CLLD totalled £54,618.20 which has enabled the committee to do the following:
- •Cleaning services, Maintenance of playpark and grass cutting, Purchase timber and rebuild the wooden bridges throughout the park.


Fundraising Initiatives:

Attended the 3 day Hebridean Celtic Festival with the catering pod. Due to the success the committee have been invited back for H.C.F 2025. This event helped raise much needed funds for the park.

Community Halloween party and Fireworks held at the park for the first time in 2 years. Huge turnout with over 300 people turning out. After purchasing equipment, stock and paying site fees and other vendors the committee raised approximately £3500.

Development Works 2024/25

- New Car Park dug out and developed, providing much needed additional parking
 A new path has been dug out which joins the new carpark to the rest of the park and the bus stop, making access easier and safer.
 - •New water defences were put in place at the River Bank to stop the river bursting and flooding the park.





Comann nam Parant (Steornabhagh)

The aim of the Association is:

to promote and support the establishment and maintenance of education through the medium of the Gaelic language, in and around Stornoway, Isle of Lewis. This includes the Stornoway Primary school, Laxdale Primary School and The Nicolson Institute School.

CnES Community Learning and Development (CLD) department in partnership with Comann nam Parant supported and developed several projects in Stornoway South last year.

The partnership supported Stornoway Primary School in developing outdoor pursuit activities that promote the use of Gaelic among children beyond the classroom, encompassing areas such as STEM, sports, and arts and drama.

The MOD tuition programme provides tutors to support pupils preparing to take part in the MOD, motivating them to perform with added confidence. As a result, the school recorded its highest number of entries to date last year.

Eco-resources, including Polycrubs and related equipment, were purchased to support growing and environmental projects. These resources are being actively used, with pupils engaging in approved activities linked to sustainability and environmental learning.

Dileab was supported across various schools, along with the Stornoway Primary play, which was a resounding success—earning the school both 1st and 2nd place in the drama competition.

CLD Strategic Partnership Group

The CLD Strategic Partnership Group (previously known as the CLD Steering Group) was established to create and oversee the delivery of the current Partnership Plan 2024-2027. It consists of key partner organisations who have a role in developing and delivering key targets identified within the plan.

Partners include UHI; SDS; TSi; Public Health WI; Volunteer Centre, Cothrom;

The Strategic Partnership Group in its governance role also undertakes self-evaluation on an annual basis to review progress against targets within the plan and have been engaging with the Improvement Service to add clarity.

Grants

Community Learning & Development staff support the dissemination of grants to community groups. Grants are available to assist groups with running costs of Community Halls; assist Senior Citizens Groups with funding for mainland trips and support youth groups with purchasing equipment.

In 2024-25 3 senior citizens groups received funding for their mainland trips; 16
Performance Grants were paid out to Community Halls/Centres to assist with running costs; North Harris Free Church received funding to assist with purchase equipment for their youth group. The Shed received funding towards a Pilot Project Trip to Glasgow for their youth group.

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
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
