The overall budget is strategic but this proposed review is unlikely to be strategic.

As an example, the proposal to reduce the level of sports grants available to our sport and activity clubs and groups by 30% will have the following affect, if we removed the per-capita grant: -

ClubSport Lewis & Harris – before £13,000, after £10,000 Uist & Barra Sports Council – before £8,500, after £5,500 Western Isles Island Games Association – before £5,000, after £5,000 (Approved CnES contribution to WIIGA) The per-capita grant would be removed.

The devolved grants made available through the sports councils reduce the barrier of cost for our clubs and associations to be able to travel inter island and off island to participate and compete in sport and activities.



The proposed reduction of 50% form the projects and activities budget will lead to a reduction in projects supporting young people to develop and affect our ability to match fund projects with partners, such as the sportscotland Athlete Travel Award Scheme (ATAS) fund, managerial support for the Island Games and CnES/NHSWI programmes.
